

Data tables: Gender Results Framework indicators

Released at 8:30 a.m. Eastern time in *The Daily*, Friday, July 19, 2019

Statistics Canada's Centre for Gender, Diversity and Inclusion Statistics has released new data tables on two gender-related topics. These statistics will be used by the [Gender Results Framework](#), a whole-of-government tool designed to track gender equality in Canada.

Using data from the 2016 Census of Population, the Centre has produced three new tables.

Two of these tables address the topic of education and skills development. The first shows the proportion of postsecondary qualification holders who are women or men, including a breakdown by field of study and highest level of education. The second table presents high school completion rates by sex.

On the topic of poverty reduction, health and well-being, the Centre has produced a table showing the proportion of the population in core housing need by economic family type.

All of these tables include a breakdown by province and territory, age group, as well as other demographic characteristics.
