Key facts on the French language in Newfoundland and Labrador, Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia in 2021

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Today, Statistics Canada is releasing three new fact sheets that describe the situation of the French language in Newfoundland and Labrador, Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia in 2021, along with certain trends observed since 1991.

These fact sheets are based on data from the 1991 to 2021 censuses of population, together with the 2011 National Household Survey. They provide information on the evolution of the population that can conduct a conversation in French, or that have French as their first official language spoken, mother tongue, language spoken at home or language used at work. In addition, they contain information on schooling in French in primary and secondary schools, on the French language among recent and established immigrants, and on the mobility and birthplaces of persons whose first official language spoken is French.
