## HOW DO PARENTS SHARE **CHILD CARE?**

In 2022, on average, mothers spent 7.5 hours per day caring for their children, while fathers spent 4.9 hours.1






About 55% of parents in different-gender couples reported sharing at least half of child care tasks equally.


However, fathers (64%) were more likely than mothers (46%) to report sharing tasks equally.

Parents were most likely to report sharing children's leisure activities equally.

Both fathers and mothers felt that child care tasks were shared more equally on weekends than on weekdays.


Percentage of mothers and fathers who reported this task was shared equally
















