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
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### The English Language in Quebec, 2001 to 2016: Facts and Figures

The purpose of this document is to present an overview of the prevailing language trends observed between 2001 and 20161 for the English language in Quebec. To this end, the document provides census-based information on the population<sup>2</sup> who have English as a first official language spoken, mother tongue, language spoken at home or language used at work as well as on the population who reported speaking English well enough to conduct a conversation.

Refers to all persons excluding institutional residents. Users should note that in the 2001 and 2006 censuses, institutional residents did not receive the long form questionnaire from which most language data were collected.

- In 2016, there were 1,103,475 persons with English as a first official language spoken in Quebec and they represented 13.7% of the province's total population. In both relative and absolute terms these are the highest figures the province has seen since at least 2001.
  - ▶ Between 2001 and 2016, the number of persons with English as a first official language spoken grew by 20.1%, a growth rate that represents an additional 184,515 persons over that period.

- In 2016, 3,958,860 persons reported being able to sustain a conversation in English, either exclusively or in combination with French. As a whole, they represented 49.1% of Quebec's total population that year.
  - ▶ Since 2001, the number of persons who reported being able to conduct a conversation in English increased by 22.4% which translates to an additional 724,115 persons. In relative terms, this population has increased by 3.7 percentage points since 2001.
- As of 2016, English-French bilingualism stood at 3,586,410 persons in number who collectively represented a 44.5% bilingualism rate in Quebec that year.
  - ▶ Between 2001 and 2016, the number of persons able to conduct a conversation in both English and French increased by 678,710 additional persons, that is, by 23.3%. In relative terms, there has been an increase of 3.7 percentage points in the English-French bilingualism rate since 2001.
  - Compared to all other provinces and territories, Quebec continues to have the single largest proportion and number of English-French bilingual people.
- In 2016, 718,985 persons or 8.9% of Quebec's population reported having English as their mother tongue, either exclusively or along with other languages.
  - ▶ The number of persons who report having English as their mother tongue has increased by 14.6% since 2001, an increase which translates to an additional 91,480 persons in 15 years.




Chart 1 English spoken at home, Quebec, 2001 to 2016<sup>1</sup>

- As of 2016, 1,545,315 persons reported speaking English at least regularly at home representing 19.2% of Quebec's total population.
  - ▶ Among them, 965,615 reported speaking English most often at home³ and 579,700 reported speaking English as their secondary language. As a proportion, they represented 12.0% and 7.2% of Quebec's total population respectively.
  - ▶ Between 2001 and 2016, the number of persons who reported speaking English at least regularly at home increased by 29.8%, a figure which translates to an additional 354,885 persons over that period.
    - Among those who reported speaking English at home at least regularly, the number of persons who reported speaking English most often<sup>3</sup> increased by 21.2% (+168,755 persons) whereas the number of persons who reported speaking English as a secondary language increased by 47.3% (+186,130 persons).
    - Over the 2001 to 2016 period, the number of persons who reported speaking English equally often with another language at home increased by 91.1%.
    - Similarly, those who reported speaking English most often in combination with another language regularly increased by 35.3% and the number of persons who reported speaking exclusively English at home increased by 0.7%.
    - Consequently, almost all the growth (98.1%) of English spoken most often at home<sup>3</sup> can be attributed to increases among those who speak English equally often with another language (+87,450 persons) and those who speak English most often in combination with another language regularly (+78,050 persons).

- In 2016, 1,924,645 workers reported using English at work at least regularly. In relative terms, they
  represented 42.5% of Quebec's working population.
  - ▶ In the 2001 to 2016 period, the number of workers who reported using English at work at least regularly grew by an additional 368,050 workers, up 23.6% in that period, compared with a growth of 15.0% for the working population.
- Among those who reported using English at least regularly at work in 2016, 876,105 persons used English most often<sup>4</sup> while 1,048,540 used it as a secondary language. In relative terms, they represented 19.3% and 23.1% of Quebec's working population respectively.
  - ▶ Between 2001 and 2016, the number of workers who reported using English most often at work⁴ increased by 176,930 workers, a 25.3% increase. Similarly, the number of workers who reported using English as a secondary language at work increased by 191,120 workers or by 22.3%.
  - ▶ In the 2001 to 2016 period, the exclusive use of English at work grew by 7.5% (+14,510 workers), the use of English most often in combination with another language regularly grew by 13.8% (+40,575 workers), while the use of English equally often with another language increased by 57.3% (+121,845 workers).
  - ▶ Slightly more than half (51.9%) of the growth in the population using English at work at least regularly can be attributed to increases among those that use English as a secondary language (+191,120 persons) in addition to the main language at work.
