

## HOW OFTEN DO ADULT CHILDREN SEE THEIR PARENTS?

IN 2017, 19.6 MILLION CANADIANS AGED 25 TO 64 YEARS (81%) HAD AT LEAST ONE **LIVING** BIOLOGICAL OR ADOPTIVE PARENT.











54% saw their father regularly










