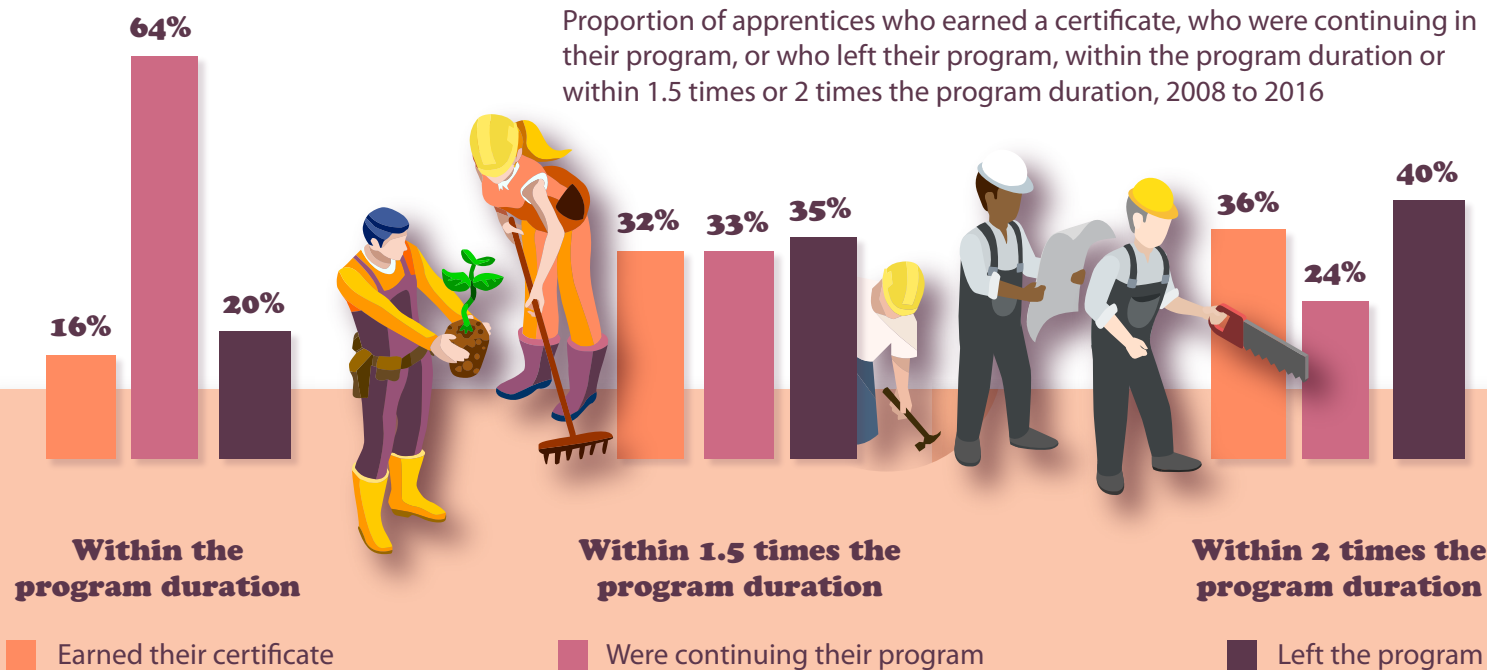

Most apprentices take **longer** than the usual program duration to earn their certificate. Among those who registered for apprenticeship training between 2008 and 2014, only **16%** had earned their certificate by the end of the program duration.

Proportion of apprentices who earned a certificate, who were continuing in their program, or who left their program, within the program duration or within 1.5 times or 2 times the program duration, 2008 to 2016



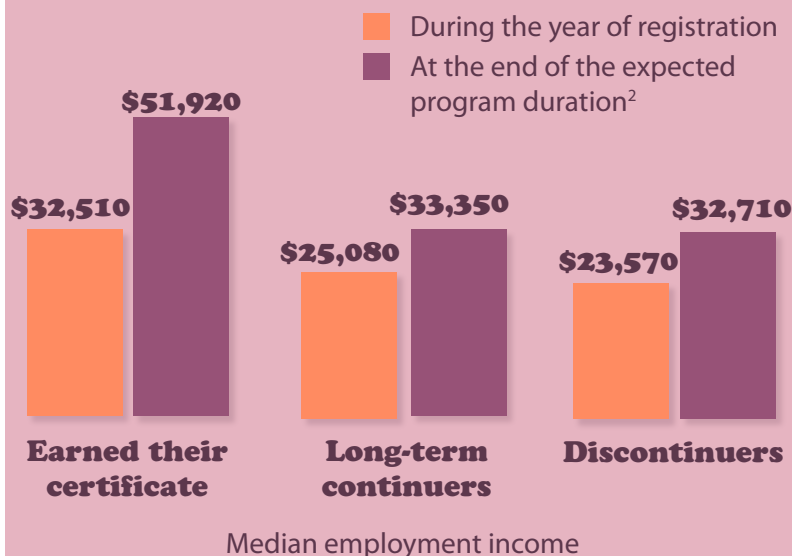
Working conditions and wages played an important role in the success of apprentices.

Apprentices who were working in a field closely related to their trade were more likely to earn their certificate than those who were not.

Apprentices who earned their certificate¹ had the highest employment income throughout their training.



1. Refers to apprentices who completed their program and earned their certificate within one-and-a-half times their program duration.
2. Refers to the year the program is expected to end, and not to the year the certificate was granted or to the year the apprentice left the program.
