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# Commentary

For a second consecutive month, employment was little changed in February (-21,000) and the unemployment rate remained at 7.4%. This recent pause in employment growth. attributable to weakness in part-time work, follows strong increases in full-time employment over the previous five months.

## Youth employment down

While the labour market situation for youths was lacklustre for much of 2003, there was relatively strong job growth that preceded the holiday season. However, this was offset by a decrease of 28,000 jobs in February, leaving the youth employment level at about the same as in August 2003. Because a large number of youths left the labour force in February, their unemployment rate rose only slightly (+0.2 percentage points) to 14.1%. The drop in youth employment was concentrated in British Columbia.

Growth in full-time employment continued for adult women, pushing up overall employment for this group by 20,000 in February. Their unemployment rate fell 0.2 percentage points to 5.8%. Since August 2003, employment among adult women has grown more rapidly (+2.1%) than among adult men (+1.0%), whose employment level was little changed in February for a second consecutive month. The unemployment rate among adult men edged up 0.1 percentage points to 6.3%.

# Decrease in health care and social assistance iobs

In February, employment fell by an estimated 31,000 in health care and social assistance. The decrease was mainly observed among women in Ontario. Despite this drop, the health care and social assistance sector has been following an upward trend since the summer of 2001.

Weakness in manufacturing continued in February, with employment little changed (-12,000) for a third consecutive month. This leaves manufacturing jobs down 83,000 (-3.5%) since November 2002, when the downward trend began.

Following strong job growth in the past two years, employment has weakened in the construction sector, with cumulative losses of 18,000 jobs in January and February. The loss observed in February was concentrated in Quebec and British Columbia, while Ontario accounted for all of the decline in January.

Employment in educational services increased by 20,000 in February, spread over a number of provinces. The growth occurred mainly in elementary and secondary education. Despite this increase, employment in educational services has changed little over the past year.

Employment increased by 16,000 in transportation and warehousing in February, almost all in Ontario. This continues the upward trend for this sector that began in the summer of 2003.

## Number of public sector employees continues to grow

In February, a drop of 21,000 self-employed workers and a slight decrease in the number of employees in the private sector more than offset the increase of 24,000 employees in the public sector. Since August 2003, the number of public sector employees has grown by 3.1% (+92,000), exceeding the 1.1% (+118,000) growth in the number of private sector employees.

Due to the weakness in construction and retail trade in February, the number of self-employed workers has now returned to about the same level as in August 2003 (-0.4%).

## **Employment down in British Columbia and little** changed in other provinces

Following strong growth in British Columbia during the last guarter of 2003, employment fell by an estimated 36,000 jobs in February, mostly among adult men and youths.

The largest employment loss in British Columbia was in retail trade, and may be the result of weaker consumer spending over this past holiday season. Employment also dropped in construction, and follows consecutive monthly declines in housing starts. The employment decline in February pushed the unemployment rate up by 0.6 percentage points to 7.9%.

Following two consecutive monthly increases, employment in Ontario was little changed (+5,000) in February, and the unemployment rate remained at 6.6%. A sharp decrease in jobs in the health care and social assistance sector was offset by increases in transportation and warehousing and in retail and wholesale trade.

In Quebec, employment was little changed for the second consecutive month. Gains in retail and wholesale trade were offset by a decrease in construction in February. However. compared to a year ago, employment in construction is up 2.8%. Manufacturing employment remained weak in February and is down 4.8% from twelve months ago. The unemployment rate fell 0.3 percentage points in February to 8.8%, the result of a decline in labour force participation.

### Winter storm forces Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island residents to miss work

In February, employment was little changed in Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island, but the number of hours worked fell sharply because of the snowstorm. In Nova Scotia hours worked fell by 15.3%, while Prince Edward Island's decrease was 13.9%. As a result, hours worked at the national level edged down 0.4%.


From the day of the storm on February 18th through the next three days, an estimated one in two Nova Scotia employees (182,000 people) missed some work as a direct result of the snow storm. This amounted to nearly 2.5 million hours, or 13.6 hours per absent employee. Similarly, just under one-half of all Prince Edward Island employees missed work due to the storm (25,000 people), with the decrease in hours worked totalling 346,000, or 14 hours per absent employee. This does not include the time lost during the cleanup period that continued the following week.



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
# Employment and unemployment indicators, seasonally adjusted, Canada




# Index of employment by industry, Canada, seasonally adjusted, January 2001 = 100




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














# **Data Quality**

# **About the Labour Force Survey**

The statistics contained in this report are based on information obtained through a sample survey of 53,000 representative households across the country. The Labour Force Survey, started in November 1945, was taken at quarterly intervals until November 1952. It has been carried out monthly since then. The information generated by the survey has expanded considerably over the years with a major redesign of the survey content in 1976 and again in 1997, and provides a rich and detailed picture of the Canadian labour market.

The sample used in the Labour Force Survey has been designed to represent all persons in the population 15 years of age and over residing in the provinces of Canada, with the exception of the following: persons living on Indian reserves, full-time members of the armed forces and people living in institutions (for example, inmates of penal institutions and patients in hospitals or nursing homes who have resided in the institution for more than six months). Monthly estimates of employment, unemployment and persons not in the labour force refer to the specific week covered by the survey each month, normally the week containing the 15th day.

## **Definitions and explanations**

The **labour force** is composed of those members of the civilian non-institutional population 15 years of age and over who, during the reference week, were employed or unemployed.

Employed persons are those who, during the reference week:

- a) did any work at all
- b) had a job but were not at work

A person is considered to be **full-time** if his/her usual hours at the main job are greater than 29 hours per week. When the number of hours worked at the main job is usually less than 30 hours per week then he/she is considered to be part-time.

**Unemployed** persons are those who, during the reference

- a) were without work, had actively looked for work in the past four weeks (ending with reference week), and were available for work:
- b) had not actively looked for work in the past four weeks but were on temporary layoff and were available for work;
- c) had not actively looked for work in the past four weeks but had a new job to start in four weeks or less from the reference week, and were available for work.

Persons in the civilian non-institutional population 15 years of age and over who, during the reference week, were neither employed nor unemployed are classified as not in the labour force.

The unemployment rate represents the number of unemployed persons expressed as a percentage of the labour force. The unemployment rate for a particular group (age, sex, etc.) is the number unemployed in that group expressed as a percentage of the labour force for that group.

The participation rate represents the labour force expressed as a percentage of the population 15 years of age and over. The participation rate for a particular group (age, sex, etc.) is the labour force in that group expressed as a percentage of the population for that group.

The employment rate (formerly the employment/ population ratio) represents the number of persons employed expressed as a percentage of the population 15 years of age and over. The employment rate for a particular group (age, sex, etc.) is the number employed in that group expressed as a percentage of the population for that group.

The part-time rate represents the number of persons employed part-time expressed as a percentage of the employed. The part-time rate for a particular group (age, sex, etc.) is the number employed part-time in that group expressed as a percentage of the employed for that group.

All geographic regions are based on the 1996 Census boundaries.

#### Seasonal adjustment

Fluctuations in economic time series are caused by seasonal, cyclical and irregular movements. A seasonally adjusted series is one from which seasonal movements have been eliminated. Seasonal movements are defined as those which are caused by regular annual events such as climate, holidays, vacation periods and cycles related to crops, production and retail sales associated with Christmas and Easter. The seasonally adjusted series contains irregular as well as longer-term cyclical fluctuations. The seasonally adjusted series are revised each year to take into account current data and to generate new forecast factors for the next twelve months. The data are therefore subject to slight revisions in future issues of this publication.

#### Sampling error

Estimates in this publication are based on the Labour Force Survey, a monthly survey of approximately 53,000 households across Canada. Because they are based on a sample survey, the estimates are subject to sampling error. Changes in the level of any estimates between two months can be the result of a true change or sampling variability. In most tables in this publication an indicator of the sampling error is provided. Two thirds of the time, a change greater than the sampling error indicates a real change. Movements in estimates that are smaller than the sampling error are less likely to reflect a real change and more likely to be due to sampling variability. While the above is true for monthly movements, one can have more confidence in a series of consecutive movements in the same direction, even though some of the monthly movements may be smaller than the sampling error.
