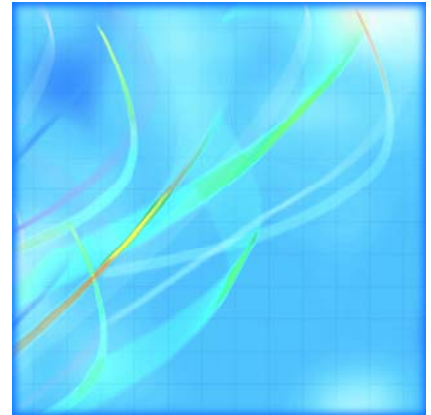

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Highlights

Residential care facilities 2002/2003 and 2003/2004

- In 2003/2004, the activity of the residential care facilities represented 4,185 facilities in Canada serving 219,472 residents and using some 109,182 full-time and 85,113 part-time employees who accumulated 382 million paid hours. The activity generated 11.6 billion dollars in revenues and expenditures.
- The growth of activities in residential care facilities remained stable when measured in terms of number of residents with an increase of 1% compared to the 217,078 residents in 2002/2003. However, revenues and expenditures increased by 6% compared to the 10.9 billion dollars in 2002/2003.
- In 2003/2004, the bulk of the activities of residential care facilities was found in the 1,941 homes for the aged that served some 179,424 residents and generated 9 billion dollars in revenues.
- The distribution of residents of facilities in Quebec by age group and sex is not available. In homes for the aged in the other provinces and territories, the resident population was distributed in 103,496 women and 42,374 men. The greater proportion of women in the population is not the only factor influencing this difference. Indeed, men, regardless of age group, are less susceptible to find themselves in a residential care facility. While 5.8% of women aged 65 years or more were in residential care facilities, only 2.8% of men in this age group imitated them.
- Facilities for persons with mental disorders formed the second largest group of residential care facilities. The number of facilities (1,936) in this category is similar to that of the homes for the aged but the activity is smaller. They served some 32,036 residents and generated 2 billion dollars in revenue. The other facilities grouped in the "other" category served slightly less than 8,000 residents and brought in a little less than half a billion dollars.
- In the homes for the aged, a resident cost on average \$50,126 a year, that is about \$136.76 a day. In facilities for persons with mental disorders, a resident cost \$64,538 a year or \$175.76 a day.

Introduction

The term "residential care facilities" refers to facilities with four beds or more that are funded, licensed or approved by provincial/territorial departments of health and/or social services. This report focuses on homes for the aged, facilities for persons with mental disorders and other facilities which provide health or social care. Facilities for the aged include homes for the aged, nursing homes, lodges for senior citizens and rest homes. Certain facilities such as apartments or other homes for seniors not providing any level of care were not included. Facilities for persons with mental disorders include facilities for the psychiatrically disabled, developmentally delayed, emotionally disturbed children and centres for those with drug/alcohol problems. Some psychiatric institutions are included here. Other residential care facilities include those that do not fit in any of the previous categories such as facilities for persons with physical disabilities, for delinquents, for transients and facilities that do not fit in any of the other categories.

History note

The survey data were published unadjusted for non-response for the period from the 1984/1985 fiscal year to the 1993/1994 fiscal year. This new publication includes data adjusted for non-response for all fiscal years since 1984/1985 except 1994/1995 and 1995/1996, for which no publishable data are available. CANSIM data include correction for non-response for all years. To maintain comparability with published data, few changes were made in the historical data for the period from the 1984/1985 fiscal year to the 1993/1994 fiscal year. However, a number of homes for the aged that had erroneously been lumped in with residential care facilities in Alberta were removed from the data for all periods.

Analysis

Overview of the industry

In 2003/2004, the residential care facility industry consisted of 4,185 facilities across Canada, serving 219,472 residents and employing 109,182 full-time and 85,113 part-time workers, who accumulated 382 million hours of paid work. The industry generated \$11.6 billion in revenue and expenses.

Growth in activity in residential care facilities remained stable when measured in terms of the number of residents, increasing by 1% over the 217,078 residents in 2002/2003. However, expenses and revenues grew by 6% compared to the \$10.9 billion in 2002/2003.

In 2003/2004, most of the activity of residential care facilities centred in the 1,941 homes for the aged, which served some 179,424 residents and generated \$9 billion in revenue.

Facilities for persons with mental disorders were the second largest group. The number of facilities (1,936) in this category is very close to that of homes for the aged but the level of activity is less. These facilities had 32,036 residents and generated \$2 billion. The other facilities included in the "Other" category served slightly fewer than 8,000 residents and reported just under \$500 million in revenue.

Senior citizens

Homes for the aged accounted for most of the activity of residential care facilities.

In 2003/2004, the 1,941 homes for the aged accounted for 47% of residential care facilities but 81% of residents and 78% of the revenue generated.

Over 90% of residents in homes for the aged live in facilities with at least 50 beds, and more than 70% of these facilities have 100 or more beds. These 1,223 facilities represent 63% of the homes for the aged but account for 91% of their revenue and expenses.

Distribution by age and sex is not available for the province of Quebec. In the other provinces, 71% of residents in homes for the aged are women and 53% of them are older than 84 years. Men represent 42,374 of the 145,870 residents in homes for the aged for which we have the distribution by age and sex. Approximately 36% of them are older than 84 years.

Residents older than 65 years in residential care facilities represented 4.5% of the population of persons aged 65 and older in provinces other than Quebec. However, this percentage varies by sex, age group and province.

The proportion of seniors who live in residential care facilities increases with age. While less than 1% of the population between the ages of 65 and 74 years are in residential care facilities, this percentage climbs to 20% for persons aged 85 years and older.

There are approximately 2.5 women for every man in residential care facilities, but the higher proportion of women in the population is not the only factor affecting this difference. Regardless of age group, men are less likely to live in residential care facilities. While 5.8% of women aged 65 and older live in such facilities, only 2.8% of men in this age group do.

The difference between the proportion of men and women living in residential care facilities increases with age. While the proportion is 0.9% for men and 1% for women between 65 and 74 years, it increases to 3.6% and 5.5% respectively for the 75 to 84 age group, and to 14% and 23.1% for persons 85 years and older. The situation is the same in all provinces.

The percentage of the senior population in residential care facilities also varies by province. The highest rate is in the Maritimes, where it ranges from 4.7% in Nova Scotia to 7.8% on Prince Edward Island.

British Columbia has the lowest rate with 3.2% of the population aged 65 years and older in facilities. The rates in the other provinces are in the middle, ranging from 4.1% in Alberta to 5.6% in Manitoba.

Data from Quebec is not available by ownership. In the other provinces, the private sector operates 77% of the homes for the aged and serves 74% of residents. The public sector represents 23% of the facilities and 26% of residents.

For profit facilities account for 52% of all the homes for the aged and 48% of residents. Non-profit facilities, which are religious and lay facilities, account for 25% of the homes for the aged and 26% of residents. In the public sector, proportions for municipal and provincial facilities were respectively 8% and 15% of all the homes for the aged. However, the proportion of residents in each group was the same at 13%.

Facilities for persons with mental disorders

Facilities for persons with mental disorders formed the second largest group of residential care facilities. The number of facilities (1,936) in this category is very comparable to that of homes for the aged, but the activity is less. They served some 32,036 residents and generated \$2 billion in revenue. The other facilities included in the "Other" category served slightly fewer than 8,000 residents and reported just under \$500 million in revenue.

Facilities with fewer than 20 beds accounted for 76% of facilities for persons with mental disorders and 460 facilities for persons with mental disorders had 20 or more beds. However, these 460 facilities accounted for two-thirds of the residents and 70% of the revenue.

The private sector is the main service provider of facilities for persons with mental disorders accounting for 90% of facilities and 91% of residents. The provinces provide most of the remaining services, accounting for 7.7% of facilities and 15.6% of residents.

The population of facilities for persons with mental disorders is divided into 19,281 men and 12,148 women. There were 4,318 people under the age of 18 years and 3,005 over the age of 65 years.

Expenses

Homes for the aged reported average expenses of \$4.6 million annually. One resident cost on average \$50,126, or \$136.76 per day. Facilities for persons with mental disorders spent about \$1 million annually to operate. One resident in such a facility cost \$64,538 per year, or \$175.76 per day.

Expenses varied by the size of the facility. In homes for the aged with fewer than 20 beds, a resident day costs an average of \$91. It costs \$118 in a facility with between 20 and 49 beds, \$135 in facilities with 50 to 99 beds and \$143 in facilities with 100 or more beds. A similar situation exists in facilities for persons with mental disorders: facilities with fewer than 20 beds report expenses per resident day of \$159 on average compared to \$184 for other facilities.

Data on the level of care is not included in the publication but exist in the database. Differences in expenses based on the size of the facility appear to reflect the level of care offered by the residential care facility. Indeed, these two variables appear to be closely linked. Over 90% of homes for the aged with 50 or more beds provide at least medical or nursing supervision, while over 80% of homes for the aged with fewer than 50 beds do not offer nursing supervision.

Definitions

Accumulated paid hours. Total hours paid for all full-time, part-time and casual employees who have had salaries or wages paid to them by the facility. Hours covering paid holiday time and other paid leave are included for all categories of personnel.

Approved beds. The number of beds licensed or approved by provincial or municipal authorities.

Beds staffed and in operation. The number of beds that are either occupied or available for new resident admissions on the last day of the reference period.

Canada, provinces and territories. "Canada" includes data for all provinces and territories.

The heading "Provinces" includes data for all provinces and excludes the territories. Province-specific data are also shown separately.

The heading "Territories" includes data for all territories. Data from the territories were combined to meet the confidentiality requirements of the *Statistics Act* and are not shown separately.

Expenditures. The costs of operating and maintaining the facility but excludes capital costs. It includes the costs in salaries and wages or in any other form for direct care services, general services as well as other expenses including interests, depreciation and taxes but excluding income tax.

Facilities. Facilities are defined by the principal characteristic of the predominant group of residents of the facility, for example, aged, persons with mental disorders and other characteristics. Although the survey collects data on more detailed principal characteristic categories, these were collapsed to meet the confidentiality requirements of the *Statistics Act*.

- **Homes for the aged.** Nursing homes, homes for the aged and other facilities providing services and care for the aged. Not included are homes for senior citizens or lodges where no care is provided.
- **Facilities for persons with mental disorders.** Facilities for persons with developmental delays, psychiatric disability, alcohol or drug problems and for emotionally disturbed children.
- **Other residential care facilities.** Facilities for persons with physical disabilities, for delinquents, for transients, and facilities which do not fit in any of the other categories. Up until 1990/1991, transition homes for women and children victim of violence were included in this category.

Full-time equivalent. The total number of paid hours divided by 1,950 hours which corresponds to a 37.5 hour work week.

Movement of residents. Admissions, discharges and death during the fiscal year.

Occupancy rate. A calculation based on the number of beds staffed occupied during the reporting period. Also referred to as "percentage occupancy". (Total days of care multiplied by 100) divided by (beds staffed multiplied by 365 or 366 for leap year).

Operating facilities. All facilities which fall under the definition of a residential care facility and were in operation at the end of the reference period. Data for non reporting operating facilities are imputed on the basis of rated bed capacity, geographical region and type of service provided.

Ownership. The person, group of persons, agency or corporate body who is the registered owner according to the deed.

- **Proprietary.** Facility owned by an individual. It also applies to private organizations and/or corporations operating for a profit.
- **Religious.** Facility owned and operated by a religious organization on a non-profit basis.
- **Lay.** Facility owned and operated by a voluntary lay body on a non-profit basis. This category excludes facilities maintained by industrial or commercial corporations (see proprietary).
- **Municipal.** Facility owned and operated by a city, county, municipality or other municipal government, or by another body which is empowered to levy taxes or to otherwise operate after the fashion of a municipality.
- **Provincial or territorial.** Facility owned by a branch, division, agency or department of a provincial or territorial government or owned and operated by a regional governance structure responsible for the continuum of health services for a defined geographic region within a province.
- **Federal.** Facility operated by a department or agency of the Government of Canada, for example, Veterans' Affairs, Health Canada or National Defence.
- **Other.** Facility which does not fit into any of the categories otherwise described. All facilities in Quebec fall into this category as their ownership cannot be further defined.

Reporting facilities. Those facilities that reported to the survey for the reference period.

Resident day. The period of service to a resident between the census taking hours on two successive days.

Residential care facilities. They include all residential facilities in Canada with four or more beds providing counselling, custodial, supervisory, personal, basic nursing and/or full nursing care to at least one resident. Excluded are those facilities providing active medical treatment (general and allied special hospitals).

Size of a facility. The size of a facility is defined by its approved bed complement.

Residential Care Facilities Survey

Survey description

The survey collects data from residential care facilities across Canada. The data are used by all levels of government, health organizations, owners of such facilities and related organizations for the purpose of program analysis, policy development, planning and research.

Data sources and methodology

Target population

The target universe includes all residential care facilities in Canada.

Provincial and territorial ministries of health and/or social services are annually requested to update the inventory of residential care facilities.

The term "residential care facilities" refers to facilities which have four beds or more and which are approved, funded or licensed by provincial/territorial departments of health and/or social services. Among the facilities included are homes for the aged, persons with physical disabilities, persons who are developmentally delayed, persons with psychiatric disabilities, persons with alcohol and drug problems, emotionally disturbed children, transients, young offenders and others.

Some of these facilities are maintained for chronically ill or disabled people who reside there more or less permanently. This is in contrast to, for example, a hospital where patients are accommodated on the basis of medical need and are provided with continuing medical care and supporting diagnostic and therapeutic services. Generally, residential care facilities provide a level of care that is below that found in hospitals, although there is some overlap.

Other residential care facilities keep their patients for shorter periods, though they still provide a care program.

Since the Residential Care Facilities Survey is facility-based, it cannot collect information about residential care given in other types of institutions, such as long-term care or chronic care provided in hospitals, even if an entire unit of the hospital provides such treatment. If such activities are transferred from a hospital to an independent institution, they will become part of the residential care facilities universe; conversely, if a residential care facility merges with a hospital, the activities may disappear from the universe. For the same reason, the survey captures activities that are outside the scope of residential care but are performed in a residential care facility. An exception to this rule is Quebec: its data for 1996/1997 and subsequent years are such that the residential care portion can, to some extent, be distinguished from the rest of the activities of health care institutions and hence estimated.

Amalgamating residential care activities with other activities or institutions is an administrative decision or a prerogative of health care authorities. However, because the survey depends on provincial sources as the primary sources of the sample frame, the survey population may vary. For example, some psychiatric institutions in Ontario were included in the list of residential care facilities until 1992/1993. Then the province redefined them as hospitals and they were removed from the frame. Similarly, a substantial number of auxiliary hospitals in Alberta were on the list of residential care facilities between 1989/1990 and 1993/1994. Some of them have since been merged with hospitals and are no longer in the residential care facilities universe.

Instrument design

The collection of data on residential care facilities began with an inventory in 1974 using an address list from Health Canada based on facilities receiving benefits from the Canada Assistance Plan (CAP). Statistics Canada has expanded this inventory. The target universe now includes all residential care facilities in Canada. Provincial and territorial ministries of health and/or social services are annually requested to update the inventory of residential care facilities.

Sampling

This survey is a census with a longitudinal design.

Data sources

Responding to this survey is mandatory. Data are collected directly from survey respondents and extracted from administrative files.

This is a combination survey of self-completed mail-out/mail-back questionnaire and administrative data from Quebec. Generally, only facilities which have four beds or more are surveyed. The exception is some composite reporting, where a head office reports on all of its residential care facilities, some of which may have fewer than four beds.

Outside of Quebec, facilities providing self sufficient, minimal or Type I care with less than 10 beds receive an abbreviated form. These facilities represent 50% of the universe. These facilities report totals for personnel (direct care services and general services) and expenses (direct care services, general services and other expenses).

The remainder of facilities, those providing Type I care with 10 beds or more and those providing Type II care or higher, receive the standard form. These facilities report totals and detailed breakdown for personnel (direct care services and general services) and expenses (direct care services, general services and other expenses).

The forms are mailed out annually in March. At the end of May, thank-you/reminder cards are sent to facilities from which a survey form has not been received. During the summer, calls are made to the facilities that have not returned a form. Again in the fall, telephone calls are made to those facilities who have not returned a form. At this point, an attempt is made to complete the form over the telephone. There are written instructions outlining the procedures for telephone reminder and form completion.

For Quebec facilities, Statistics Canada receives from the Ministère de la Santé et des Services sociaux administrative data files obtained from public and private facilities under agreement through the M-30 system for financial data and from forms AS-478, AS-480, AS-484 and AS-485 for statistical data.

Error detection

Survey forms are edited in groups by province, principal characteristic and the number of beds in the facility to ensure consistency in reporting. Each form is compared section-by-section to previous years' reports from the facility. Significant changes such as an increase or decrease of 20% with no change in the number of beds are referred to the supervisor. If there is no indication that there has been a change in funding in the province, the supervisor arranges for a follow-up call to the facility. If a financial statement is included with the survey return, an effort is made to use the information in the editing.

The Quebec electronic data are reformatted into individual files which are then submitted to the same manual editing procedures as the survey forms.

There are a number of on-line edits, most relating to an acceptable range for the cell and/or its relationship to data in another cell. Columns are automatically summed so that they can be compared with the total provided by the facility. Consistency checks are also built in to the process.

A query is produced when a value falls outside the range specified in the edits. The supervisor handles queries by contacting the facility, or provincial contact.

Once the editing is completed the data are produced in 32 standard tables by principal characteristic and type of care. These tables are manually compared with the previous year's tables.

Imputation

Imputation for each facility in a total or partial non-response situation was done by imputing the predicted value of a multi-variate regression using the GLM procedure in SAS for total income, expenditures and hours worked. Independent variables are basically the characteristics of the facility as provided by the provincial department of health. These characteristics include services, type of property, region or province, level of care and number of maximum bed capacity. The other cells were imputed by assigning them a weight corresponding to their percentage of these totals in similar facilities. Great care was taken to ensure that incomplete answers given by facilities were not replaced by estimates and that the overall results remained consistent.

Estimation

Since the imputation is done for each facility, data estimation is merely the sum of imputed or reported data for each published category. These categories are generally province, service and characteristics of the residents.

Quebec data come from administrative sources. Initially, the data had to be reformatted to establish conceptual equivalents to the cells of the questionnaire. In addition, Quebec facilities report financial data at the corporation level. A corporation is an economic and administrative unit that may include various components, each with its own objectives. For example, a corporation whose primary objective is residential care may include facilities whose activities relate to outpatient or hospital care. This means that many of the financial data from this type of corporation may include a significant number of activities unrelated to residential care. The inclusion of these activities in the accounts of residential care facilities could artificially inflate them. To reduce this bias, an attempt was made to differentiate, in administrative documents, activities purely attributable to residential care facilities from other activities and to report only the former in the accounts. Weighting was attributed to common activities, as well as to those that could not be differentiated (such as administrative activities or research). In this sense, Quebec data from 1996 are an estimate of residential care activities. This adjustment was not made for historical data prior to 1994/1995. Hence, those data refer to complete data for corporations deemed to be residential care facilities regardless of the division of activities within the corporations. They may therefore include a significant portion of activities that are outside the scope of residential care.

Quality evaluation

Year to year comparison are made on some variables like response rate, revenues and expenditures, cost per resident day, etc. As well, comparisons are also made within the file on key variables like type of residents versus type of facility.

Disclosure control

Statistics Canada is prohibited by law from releasing any data which would divulge information obtained under the *Statistics Act* that relates to any identifiable person, business or organization without the prior knowledge or the consent in writing of that person, business or organization. Various confidentiality rules are applied to all data that are released or published to prevent the publication or disclosure of any information deemed confidential. If necessary, data are suppressed to prevent direct or residual disclosure of identifiable data.

Occurrences of less than three in a table are suppressed. Information about individual facilities is not released.

Data accuracy

Completion of the survey is a legal requirement under the *Statistics Act*. The survey's response rate was 72% of all residential care facilities between 1984/1985 and 1993/1994, 77% between 1996/1997 and 1999/2000, and 80% since 2000/2001. Respondent facilities accounted for 79%, 82% and 84% of all beds respectively. There are no published data for 1994/1995 and 1995/1996. These general statistics sometimes conceal situations that vary widely depending on the province and the type of service provided. In particular, the response rate for homes for the aged in Manitoba ranged from 2% to 12% of all institutions between 1984/1985 and 1990/1991, and then jumped to more than 80%.
